Proclamation and believability: This Sunday's readings point out the importance of the Liturgy of the Word and the Scriptures we hear proclaimed each Sunday. The best way for this to happen is for priests, deacons, and readers to make a concerted effort to live the Scripture passage in as many practical ways in their daily life as they can the week before they proclaim it. In this way the believability of the proclamation comes from the conviction of their very lived experience of the Scriptures. For members of the assembly (the community of Faith gathered in celebration), this means that the Scriptures heard on Sunday aren't simply nice readings listened to then quickly forgotten, but words listened to so deeply that they make a difference in our lives. We hear these readings in order to be changed. We say it again: the readings ought not to be forgotten as soon as we're out of the church doors but they ought to be carried over into the way we live. The Scriptures are a blueprint for our everyday Gospel living. Fluidity in the liturgical year: At first glance the first reading and gospel might seem more appropriate for Lent than for a Sunday in Ordinary Time because they speak so strongly of repentance and fasting and penance. This challenges us to think about the liturgical year not in terms of discrete seasons with limited motifs, but as a fluidity in which the dying and rising of the paschal mystery keep showing up in different contexts. In today's readings the call to repentance comes within the context of the call to follow Jesus. During Lent we see a different context for repentance – preparation for or renewing our baptismal commitment and preparing to enter into the solemn Easter mysteries.

First Reading: This is the only Sunday in all three years of the Lectionary cycle of readings that we hear a passage from the book of Jonah proclaimed. God's mercy abounds! This is the message of the reading which recounts Jonah's journey to Ninevah with the prophetic message of repentance and change. The people of Nineveh heard the possibility of destruction and turned away from evil. God, in turn, responded choosing life over destruction. Gospel: Leave your job and family. Follow Jesus, not alone, but with others. Repent. Accept and live the message that the kingdom of God is at hand. These are summary statements of the call to discipleship found in Mark. We, like the first disciples, come after Jesus, believing that in him God's kingdom is present. This is the kingdom we proclaim to the world by virtue of our Baptism and our repentance.

Thank you to all the families who came along to our meeting last Sunday as we begin preparation for First Reconciliation (Confession) and First Eucharist (Communion). We will enroll our candidates during the 10am Mass on Sunday 1st February 2015. Please encourage these candidates and their families through your own witness to our Faith and by your prayerful support.

Infant Baptism. There will be preparation meeting for parents and godparents, who would like to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism during the Easter Season after 10am Mass on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> March 2015. Baptism is not usually celebrated during Lent.
