#### CARVED OLIVE WOOD FROM THE HOLY LAND

Hand crafted products are on sale in the porch this weekend. This a way of directly supporting and helping Christian Palestinian families in Bethlehem to stay in work.

We represent more than 200 Christian families mainly in Bethlehem and some areas in Jerusalem in a noble cause mission to explain the terrible situation in our area and we are selling beautiful articles of those remaining Christians of the Holy Land. Latest statistic confirm that there are only 2% Christians remaining. Just five years ago more than 300 families emigrated from the Bethlehem Area and our future is uncertain. Since the time of the Crusades, the most important source of income for the Christians in the holy land is the sales of these olive wood handicrafts. As a result of the political unrest in the region, this source of income has dried up in recent years, with grave implications for the Christian families.

#### **ABOUT LITURGY**

Advent penance service: Many parishes offer communal penance liturgies at least twice a year, during Advent and Lent. The readings this Sunday remind us that this sacrament is not primarily about lists of sins but about repentance, changing one's heart. Just as with all the sacraments, we celebrate the ritual as a way of appropriating the insight of the sacraments, we celebrate the ritual as a way of appropriating the insight of sacrament, namely to "take off" the robes of sin and "put on the splendour" (first reading) of the gospel attitudes of repentance and forgiveness.

**Penitential act:** Sometimes people claim that they have no need for the sacrament of penance because every Sunday Mass begins with a penitential act. Two points by way of response might be made to such objections. First of all, the penitential act isn't the same as the sacrament of penance and so it doesn't replace in our Christian practice the need for this special sacrament that is a concrete sign of God's forgiveness and promised healing. Second, the "penitential act" really isn't primarily about the forgiveness of sins as such but is about celebrating God's mercy and offer of salvation that always leads us to praise and thanksgiving.

Although, it is always good to acknowledge our sinfulness and beg for God's mercy, it is telling that *The Roman Missal* gives us other choices for the introductory rites and it is good pastoral practice to choose carefully among them according to the liturgical season and/or festival. For example, since Lent is a penitential season, on the Sundays of Lent the strongest option among that choices for the penitential act might be to use the *Confiteor* ("I confess to almighty God..."). On other Sundays of the year another choice might be more appropriate, especially since every Sunday is a celebration of resurrection.

### **Lectionary for Mass**

First Reading: These words are addressed to exiles who still remember the pain of being "led away on foot by their enemies." The prophet's promise is of complete reversal. God will remember his people and return them to their home from which they were snatched. God will clear the way for their return, levelling the lofty mountains and filling in the "age—old depths." These words of hope don't speak only to people displaced geographically, but to each of us who has experienced our own exile of estrangement and spiritual malaise. God is at work turning sorrow to joy!

Responsorial Psalm 126: God never abandons or disappoints. But it takes eyes of faith to perceive that truth because sometimes the evidence is not available to our senses. It is counterintuitive to believe that those "who sow in tears / shall reap rejoicing." And no matter how many times our cynicism has been proven wrong, it returns to cast a shadow over hope. But the psalmist is convinced that misfortune and that misfortune and tears are not the final word. Through God's merciful goodness seems like a dream too good to be true, to rouses the tongue to laughter and joy!

**Second Reading:** In this letter of joy written from prison Paul reminds us that the work of conversion lasts a life-long process of growth that doesn't end till we stand before the Lord. Paul encourages the Philippians to continue doing what they've been doing, only more!

Gospel: God's salvation approaches and nothing will stand in its way. Mountains will be levelled and valleys filled in so nothing can impede the progress of God's Kingdom. Luke situates John within a very specific historic and geographical context with a clear nod to the Roman authorities and the religious elite who will prove to be the Kingdom's first opponents. But somehow we sense that the voice in the desert knows full well that those who walk the halls well that those who walk the halls of power will be no match for the one whose advent he proclaims.
