ABOUT LITURGY

Silences during Mass: Several times during Mass it is appropriate to pause in silence. These silent times enable us to surrender ourselves to God's Presence, to remember that the Spirit dwells within us and enables us to reverse the "absence" of the Ascension: through the power of the Spirit within us the risen Christ is present.

First, both the Rite of the Blessing and Sprinkling of Water and the Penitential Act call for a brief period of silence and reflection. This time allows us to make the transition from our busy lives into God's Presence, consciously surrender ourselves to God's word-action within us, and call to mind anything that we have done that keeps us from giving ourselves over to taking up Jesus' saving mission as his faithful disciples "clothed with power from on high." Although this time is brief (and in some cases so as to be non-existent!) it is mightily important; this opens the door for our participation in the rest of Mass. We take much time to prepare for important events in our lives; surely this brief time is no less important!

Second, after Communion there may be a brief period of silence. Since we have just shared in eating and drinking the Body and Blood of Christ, this is time afforded us to appreciate more fully what we have shared and think about how we might be a better presence of the Body and Blood of Christ to others in our daily living. We might consider one specific way during the coming week when we will consciously be the presence of the risen Christ for someone else.

FATHER PATRICK BAILEY

Fr Bailey, parish priest of St Columba, Chesham, is now in a care home in Aylesbury for a period of convalescence. He is in good spirits and appreciates all our prayers for this recovery. Father Andy is continuing to assist with the pastoral and sacramental needs of the parish during Fr Bailey's absence.

RESTORATION OF FURNITURE AND FITTINGS IN OUR LADY'S CHURCH

The **brass plaque** of **Sec. Lieut. George Bourchier**, has been cleaned, polished and returned to the side chapel. Its surface has been coated and sealed in a lacquer, which should preserve its restored appearance. This plaque should now only be wiped with a soft, dry cloth using no polish or cleaning chemicals to preserve the lacquered seal. The presiding chair and deacons' stools and kneeler of the *prie-dieu* in the Sanctuary have been reupholstered and recovered in a blue fabric in honour of our parish's patron. Our thanks to parishioners who generously funded these works.

Lectionary for Mass

About this Solemnity The distinct celebration of the Ascension of the Lord was unknown in the first three and a half centuries. The chronology of dating the Ascension to forty days after Lent exists only in the Acts of the Apostles. In the Gospel according to Luke, the Ascension appears to have taken place much earlier, even on Easter Day. The original ending to Mark's account of the Gospel did not include the Ascension at all, and it can only be inferred from Matthew's conclusion. When fourth-century Egeria mentions a celebration forty days after Easter in Bethlehem, it may have been for the Holy Innocents. But by the fifth century the observance seems to be universally accepted.

First Reading: The opening verses of Acts of the Apostles offers details of the teaching of Jesus about the sending of the Spirit. Even at this moment, the disciples are still fixed on the centrality of Israel. The expansion of their mission is documented in detail throughout the book. This is followed by the story of the Ascension, and the detail of the angels is evocative of Luke's Resurrection narrative.

Responsorial Psalm 47: This hymn of praise celebrates God's enthronement. At its centre is the belief that God is king. It may have been used in a rite in the Temple in which the ark was carried and then placed within the Temple. The language evokes the language of the Feast of Tabernacles.

Second Reading: The kind of knowledge of God of which Paul speaks is not some sort of abstract or philosophical knowledge. Rather, it is knowledge of the person of Jesus Christ through whom God is revealed. The entire passage witnesses to the fact that it is God who is revealed in Christ, and to whom Christ has returned in glory. As in the psalm, we encounter the theme of enthronement.

Gospel: The Gospel according to Luke closes with the appearance of Jesus. He reiterates the instructions that they have been given to preach his message. He promises them the Spirit, which will give them "power from on high." The final scene is that of the Lord's Ascension. This will be the first scene of the Acts of the Apostles. Note that they return to Jerusalem, the city from which they return fled crest-fallen. This will be the place where the first major Christian community develops.
