About Liturgy

Liturgy's true focus: Just as with our everyday lives and all the possessions we have, it is also easy to lose sight of the true focus of liturgy itself. Without realising it we can get so completely caught up in the doing of liturgy that subtly we put ourselves at the centre. For example, we can be so concerned about hospitality that we forget this isn't a simple gathering of the folks, but an assembly gathered to hear God's call to be in divine Presence. Or we can be so caught up in doing good music that we forget the music's purpose is to draw us into the ritual action to be transformed into being more perfect members of Christ's Body, the church. Or we can be so caught up in our own need for private prayer time that we can easily forget that at liturgy we surrender ourselves and our personal needs in order to be the church called into God's Presence.

Each Sunday it would be good practice if each assembly member examined why he or she comes to celebrate liturgy. Ultimately we come to respond to God's call and to give praise and thanks for God's tremendous gifts of life and Godself to us.

There is a popular saying that states: "live simply, that others may simply live." Some attribute this saying to Mahatma Ghandi while others claim Blessed Teresa of Calcutta as its source. Regardless of which of these two prophetic witnesses wrote it, the message is certainly one that we hear today in the life and ministry of Pope Francis as well as that of Jesus who speaks similar words in today's Gospel. The lazy days of summertime make a good time to rid ourselves of extra stuff, so that we might live simply. Disconnect form the smart phone, the social media, and the technology for a while. Take a walk on the woods, the beach or near a lake. Make time to talk to your children or your aging parents or your neighbour with you've been out of touch with for a while. Connect with people, not things.

Lectionary for Mass

First Reading: Wisdom literature focuses on the meaning and significance of everyday life, especially in those things that matter in our relationship to God and one another. The key lesson of Ecclesiates is that life is "vanity of vanities," transitory like vapour or breath that quickly vanishes. Those who work hard at gaining possessions and wealth will soon die and leave the possessions to one who has not worked for them. Striving for material things brings with it worry, anxiety and sleepless nights. Death makes such struggle futile and meaningless. Wisdom's lesson is to focus on the transitory nature of life and strive for things that truly matter in life. Only by attuning to God's values and path, and not our limited and often distorted values, leads to face and work through life's transitory nature.

Responsorial Psalm 89: This communal lament invites us to be attentive to God's voice, God's way of doing things, and not harden our heart in the process. Reflecting a strong wisdom focus, the psalm speaks of the transitory nature of life, along the lines of Ecclesiastes, and of our need for the Lord's guidance "make us know the shortness of our life, / that we may gain wisdom of heart." Such wisdom is acquired by petitioning God to "[F]ill us . . . with your love," namely with hesed or covenant love which helps us focus on right relationship to God, others, and all creation. In so doing, God's gracious care will be ours and the work of our hands, aligned to God's work, will indeed prosper.

Second Reading: If in Baptism we have been raised with Christ, then it must manifest itself in our manner of living and relating to God and one another. Our life is now hidden with Christ in God such that we no longer act but Christ acts in and through us. We are challenged to put away all that is "earthly," namely all that causes our hearts to harden and not be attuned to Christ's way of living and acting. In baptism we have put on Christ so we must live as Christ. Since "Christ is everything and in everything," we are all bonded to each other, all divisions and eliminated, and nothing can ever separate us from God and one another.

Gospel: Luke's Jesus is always attuned to the obstacles that riches pose in our efforts to attune ourselves to God's voice and way of operating. The "rich fool" parable becomes a living example of one who has not learned that "one's life does not consist of possessions." Ecclesiates' wisdom of the "vanity" of life, the worries that come with possessions, and the uncertainty of inheritance upon death, are reiterated by Jesus as an important teaching lesson for all disciples. Jesus teaches us that we are all called to become "rich in the sight of God" and not in storing "up treasures for ourselves." Only by responding to God's covenant love offered to us in Christ, and striving to be in right relationship with all, will we ever achieve true wisdom of heart.
