About Liturgy

East and light as symbol: We all know that the sun rises in the east, but probably most of us don't realise what a strong symbol this has always been, both in Christian theology and architecture.

Resurrection: All four gospels mention that it was early in the morning on the first day of the week that they found the empty tomb. Hence, the sun rising in the east is a natural symbol for the resurrection. Morning Prayer, ideally celebrated early in the morning, is a resurrection prayer and has motifs of light and glory as well as praise. Second Coming: From earliest times Christians looked east for Christ's Second Coming, the source of light and new dawning of life. Church axis: Early church buildings were always constructed on an east-west axis; the altar was situated at one end so the assembly, standing facing the altar, faced east. A parallel symbolism of this axis is that as they left the building they left facing west – a symbol of darkness, sin, and evil. This was a constant reminder that the light showered upon them at liturgy was to be taken into a world darknesd by sin, that they were to be the light dispelling that darkness.

Posture: In the early church it was customary to turn eastward for prayer. During baptisms the elect would face westward to renounce Satan and then turn eastward to recite the Creed.

Lectionary for Mass

First Reading: Isaiah reminds us that the true wealth of the Jewish people lay in its children. No wealth compares: a lavish procession of camels bearing gold or all the riches of the seas cannot come close to the beloved face of one daughter or son. What parent cannot relate to "your heart shall throb and overflow" at the sight of one's child, especially one who has been threatened, as today's climate of violence has made increasingly frightening? Poor and inferior in many ways, Israel is radiant because of god's presence with her.

Responsorial Psalm 72: This hopes of all the world's peoples are ultimately the same: for peace, wise leadership, just government. People around the globe will hear and sing this psalm today in their own languages, a tribute to the magi who came from afar to worship the infant Jesus. This is the feast of inclusivity; no one was unwelcome at Bethlehem.

Second Reading: Christians who hadn't been born Jewish must have felt enormous relief to hear this message to Ephesians. They are in no way second-class in the new Christian community. Rather, they are affirmed as coheirs, members of Christ's body, sharers in the promise. What might have been a small, middle-eastern sect can now spread gloriously throughout the world, to everyone.

The Gospel: This story of the Magi following the star to find and worship the newborn King, stopping to ask Herod, then continuing to Bethlehem were, overjoyed, they find the child with his mother is deeply familiar, and resonates not only because people have heard it so often. Those in the assembly have also pursued quests, with varying degrees of success. They have looked to their own stars, and may have blundered into palaces of evil along the way. But the Gospel brings hope at the journey's end, a new way of being and a return" by another way."
