## **Lectionary for Mass**

**First Reading:** Throughout Easter Time, our First Reading is taken from the Acts of the Apostles, leading us to reflect upon the story of the first Christians and the community of believers. The brief passage from the Acts of Apostles which we hear today provides a glimpse into the life of the early Christian community, a vision statement of the ideal community in which God is praised and the people are in communion with one another.

**Responsorial Psalm 117:** Through the proclamation of Psalm 117, we are called together to sing the praise of God whose "love has no end." The psalmist acknowledges that we may falter and fall at times, yet the Lord is our strength. Particularly in Easter Time, our song of praise is appropriate. The rejected stone has become the cornerstone. "This day was made by the Lord; we rejoice and are glad."

**Second Reading:** The second reading, from 1 Peter, begins with a great proclamation of praise, summarizing, namely the Resurrection of Jesus Christ which opens the doors to salvation for those who are "safeguarded through faith" by the power of God. While we may have to suffer through various trails, we are encouraged to remain steadfast in faith, insuring that we will attain the goal of our faith, salvation in Jesus Christ.

The Gospel: Our reflection on this passage from the Gospel according to John often focuses on Thomas, whom we often label "doubting." So much so, we may miss the other aspects of the story: Jesus' proclamation of peace, the disciples being sent, the gift of the Holy Spirit, the life that is offered through belief in Christ. The familiar story of the disciples' encounter with the Risen Christ encourage our focus on faith, even when we experience doubt, and the impact of this faith in our lives: peace, mission, and new, life.

### About Liturgy Seeing, believing, and Devotional items:

The church has for centuries helped us to believe what we cannot see by using these things perceptible to our sense of sight, hearing, touch, taste, and smell. The most obvious examples are our sacraments that use water, oil, imposition of hands, bread, wine, etc. – visible signs – to lead us to the invisible grace of God is offering us. The gospel this Sunday reminds us, too, that our belief is strengthened when we surround ourselves with other visible signs of Jesus' risen Presence and caring love for us. Without turning our homes into veritable shrines, we might look around where we live and determines if there are *any* signs at all

around where we live and determines if there are *any* signs at all of our belief. When guests come into our home, do they know that we take our religious practices seriously? Do they see a crucifix or a statue of a favourite saint? Do they see a well-used Bible? Perhaps a nice Easter present for ourselves might be to a religious article shop and buy something that is good art that can also speak to us and others about our belief.

These religious articles in our homes can also remind us that religion isn't simply an hour-on-Sunday deal with God. They can help us turn our lives towards God and express our belief by charitable actions on behalf of others. Belief, after all, is strengthened by the good we do for each other in the name of the risen Jesus.
