About Good Shepherd Sunday

The Fourth Sunday of Easter is traditionally referred to as Good Shepherd Sunday. Hearing the Shepherd's voice, followers recognise and know it is their God. Safe in the knowledge that they cannot be taken from the hand of the Shepherd, those who hear his voice follow as faithful believers willing to go where God calls and sends them. When all the clamour of false voices threaten to overwhelm, we have only to listen carefully to be led to do the work of the Father.

First Reading: We read Peter's discourse following the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost in weekday liturgies during the octave of Easter, however those who only attend Sunday liturgies will not have heard this passage this season. Peter proclaims that Jesus is both Lord and Christ. Those who were gathered were cut to the heart. About three thousand persons hear Peter's call for repentance and are baptised.

Responsorial Psalm 22: As a response to the First Reading, this beloved psalm captures the longing for God's love and protection which we all experience. This psalm is particularly appropriate today as a link to the Gospel and what is commonly known as "Good Shepherd Sunday," with Jesus' self-reference as the "gate for the sheep." With the Lord as our shepherd, we want nothing: the overflowing cup of God's guidance m courage, goodness and kindness provide all we need.

Second Reading: Patience in suffering for doing what is good is not easy, yet Christ our shepherd has shown us that this is the way which we are to walk, and is a "grace before God." We are called to walk in the footsteps of the Lord who did not return suffering for suffering, but rather relied upon God's just judgement. Through Christ's suffering, we have been healed, freed to live for righteousness, called to return to the shepherd who guards and keeps us safe.

The Gospel As he addresses the Pharisees, Jesus reveals himself as the gate for the sheep, leading them to good pasture, in contrast to those who have come before him who have led the sheep astray. While the Pharisees do not understand his figure of speech, we grasp his message: we who hear the voice and enter the gate who is Christ know the abundant life which is found in God's love.
