

**About Liturgy** 

Liturgical structure: Each liturgy embodies within its very shape or structure the dying and rising dynamic of the paschal mystery. For example, at Mass the Liturgy of the Word's prophetic challenge to living the gospel reminds us that our everyday living is to be united with Christ's ministry of reaching out to others. In the Liturgy of the Eucharist we praise and thank God for the gift of new life and salvation. and for the nourishing strength given us as we come to the eucharistic table. Within the very unfolding of the liturgy the balance of dying and rising is presented, always reminding us that the dying leads us to new

Daily living: In daily living the balance between dying and rising isn't always so apparent because they usually don't flow one into the other, as is true with the ritual structure of the liturgy. In other words, we can't approach the mystery with the attitude, "Okay, I've done my suffering; now where's the new life?" However, there are even hints of the balance in our daily lives. For example, parents generally give of themselves unreservedly for their children's welfare. At the same time they experience great pride and joy in watching their children grow into healthy, happy, productive adults. Another way to consider the dying and rising is that in the very dying is the new life. This is so because in dying to ourselves - by conforming our wills to God's, by committing ourselves to the good of others, etc. - we are become more like Christ onto whom we were grafted at baptism. Becoming more like Christ Sunday teaches us, by dying to self we receive new life. What God offers us when we surrender our life to living gospel values is unimaginable to us humans. God offers us a share in the risen life of the Son.

# **Lectionary for Mass**

First Reading: Jeremiah's words outwardly express his internal, personal frustration with the Lord. Others have scorned and reproached Jeremiah for his prophesies such that he no longer wants to speak the Lord's name. Yet the power of the Lord's name becomes too much for him to keep inside. Later in Jeremiah's words, which we do not hear today, he affirms the Lord's presence with him. This will allow those who persecute him not to win out.

Responsorial Psalm 62: The Responsorial Psalm assigned for today is also one of the common psalms for Ordinary Time. In the psalm, the author longs deeply for God to the point that his soul thirsts for him. The psalmist's confidence in the Lord's kindness and care is evident. Like us, the author has gazed upon the Lord in the sanctuary and known the riches of the banquet. The Lord who provides is also the Lord to whom we cling when others scorn us as they did Jeremiah.

Second Reading: For three more Sunday's our Second Reading comes from Paul's letter to the Romans. Today's two verses come from the beginning of Romans 2, a chapter in which Paul instructs the Romans on how they responsibly live in light of the free gift of justification in Christ. They cannot live with disregard for their actions. God holds them accountable for now in Christ, they must imitate him by offering their bodies as living sacrifices. Conformity to Christ, not the world is the Christian charge. Living in Christ will lead us to discern God's will for us.

Gospel: This Sunday's Gospel reading follows immediately upon last Sunday's in which Simon Peter professed Jesus as the Christ and in turn, Jesus blessed Peter with the keys to the kingdom and acknowledge that the Church would be built upon him. In today's Gospel, Jesus is realistic with this disciples informing them that he must suffer, die, and rise. Peter rebukes the Lord, disagreeing with him, perhaps neither hearing nor understanding what it meant that Jesus would be raised. Jesus, in turn rebukes Peter, and teaches the disciples that if they wish to follow, the Cross is also theirs. The cross is ours, too, and we know that death leads to Resurrection.

## Prayer to Begin a School

God of wisdom and might, we praise you for the wonders of our being, for mind, body and spirit. Be with our children as they begin a new school year. Bless them and their teachers and staff. give them strength and grace as their bodies grow; wisdom and knowledge to their minds as they search for understanding: and peace and zeal to their spirit.
