About Liturgy

Controversy in Matthew's gospel: In Matthew's gospel Jesus tells many parables about the kingdom after he arrives in Jerusalem (for the past four Sundays we've listened to some of the kingdom parables). The controversy between Jesus and some of the Jewish leaders in sharpening. Some of the parables even include the killing of someone; last week, for example, the wretched vineyard tenants kill the landowner's son and this week in the parable about the king who invites quests to his son's wedding feast the king's servant-messengers are killed. This imagery has layers of meaning. God's own Son will likewise be killed. Those expected to have reward – to sit at the messianic banquet – lose out because of their bad behaviour and those least expected share in God's graciousness. Matthew seems intent on not letting his readers miss his point about inclusivity and so has Jesus tell story after story demonstrating this theme.

Over and over in these parables about the kingdom Jesus confronts us with the message that those are expecting to enter the kingdom will not, and those thought to be kept out of the kingdom will be ushered in. The thorny issue of the historical context of Matthew's gospel is that some of the Jewish leaders (chief priests, elders, scribes, Pharisees, Sadducees) presume that they will inherit the blessing of God's promises because they meticulously keep the law. Sinners (prostitutes, tax collectors) cannot possibly be favoured by God. Israel, as God's chosen people, will inherit; the Gentiles will not. Jesus' message of salvation for all is confronting, challenging, and intolerable for those who presume to know whom God favours and whom God does not.

Lectionary for Mass

First Reading: We move ahead in Isaiah to chapter 25 for this Sunday's First Reading. The entirety of this chapter describes the day when the Lord will provide victory for his people. Specifically, the verses chosen for toady paint the picture of the mountain, Zion, on which the victory will take place. It is on this mountain that the Lord will also nourish his people with a splendid feast. The people's tears of defeat at the hands of their enemies, Assyria included, will no longer need to shed. Salvation is the victory of God's people.

Responsorial Psalm 22: This Psalm is used on the Fourth Sunday of Lent, although with a different refrain. Rather than emphasising that the Lord is our Shepherd as the refrain does on the Fourth Sunday of Lent, today's refrain proclaims our life forever in the Lord's house. This follows on the beautiful picture in the First Reading of the day when we will know our salvation with all of God's people on the holy mountain of heaven.

Second Reading: Paul knows how to support himself in his work of spreading the Gospel. If he needed to labour, he did. In this passage, he expresses to us that has the ability to live in both scarcity and abundance. Yet, the Philippians sent him a gift of money, for which he is thankful. Paul accepted the gift, although he believed that God provides for his every need. This is the truth of faith he teaches the Philippians. We trust God provides enough for us in Christ Jesus, often working through others who respond to our needs as the Philippians reached out to Paul.

Gospel: Jesus continues to speak to the chief priests and elders in another parable. This time the parable centres on whom God invites to the banquet of the Kingdom of heaven. The king sends his servants into the streets to invite people to the feast, since those who were invited did not come, showing their own unworthiness. The servants bring back a variety of people, but the king notes how some are not wearing the proper attire for a wedding banquet. They are invited, but not chosen for they have not turned to the Lord and put on the wedding garment.
