Scripture Insights

Today, Jeremiah, peter, and Jesus teach us about responding to Where else are ones actions and deeds expressed than in and by suffering that faithfulness to God and one's God-given vocation

often brings. Almost always, the suffering comes at the hands of A lving sacrifice given up to God; suffering not only accepted, but

the very ones to whom God's servent is sent.unable and unwilling to hear God's message, they try to destroy God's messenger. No prophet in the Old Testament suffered as greatly as did Jeremiah. He was rejected and persecuted by others and inwardly conflicted about his call from God (Jeremiah 26:7 - 15). Today's First Reading - from the so-called confessions of Jeremiah recounts one such

So great is Jeremiah's anguish that he is ready

to abandon his prophetic call. Yet, God's Word is like a fire burning in his heart; his is copelled to speak. He cannot help but be faithful. Jesus, too, knew distress and anguish in the face of his sufferings (Matthew 26:37-38) and he, too, was faithful to the Father's will, as we see today and later in 26:39-46. It's no wonder that the early believers were reminded of Jeremish when reflecting on the sufferings of Jesus (see Matthew 16:14). Significantly, jesus' words about taking up our cross in today's Gospel reading remind us that the way of the disciple can be no different from his, and it is a way that must be shown in one's actions and deeds (or "conduct" as the Lectionary renders the Greek praxis, at the end of the reading).

In a similar vein, Paul describes this manner of losing one's life as an offering of one's self, one's very body, as a "living sacrifice."

Liturgy and Life

How might you quiet yourself during the day to renew your mind and open vourself to the will of God? (2) What cross so you take up to follow Jesus? (3) What are the temptations you face to put down your cross?

Connections to Church Teaching and Tradition Paul's Letter to the Romans is clear that human beings can focus their lives on pleasing God. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states "God created man a rational being, conferring on him the dignity of a person who can initiate and control his own actions" (1730). With the free will that God has given humankind, the Catechism continues, arises a tension between

choosing good or evil. "As long as freedom has not bound itself definitively to its ultimate good, which is God, there is the possibility of choosing between good and evil, and thus of growing in perfection or of failing and sinning" (1732).

In the Second Reading, Paul tells the Romans to "be transformed by the renewal of your mind." The Catechism explains that conscience is the secret core of the human person where God's will is discerned. Quoting Guadium et spes, 16, the Catechism states, "Deep within his conscience man discovers a law which he has not laid upon himself but which is good and to avoid evil, sounds in his heart at the right moment. When he listens to his conscience, the prudent man can hear God speaking" (1776).

REOPENING OF OUR LADY'S CHURCH FOR MASS

Our Lady's Church is now open for Mass and public worship. You are reminded that the dispensation for not attending Sunday Mass, granted by the Bishops, is still in force, so there is no obligation to parishioners to attend a Sunday Mass. It could be some time before we return to normal. The safety of everyone is of paramount importance to our Bishop, and he does not wish for anyone to be placed in vulnerable position of any kind. Outside of public liturgies advertised, you are invited to come and spend time in private prayer before the Blessed Sacrament:

Mondays: 2pm – 4pm and Thursdays: 10am to 12noon. I am so grateful to those who have volunteered to act as stewards to ensure that we have a prayerful environment in the church and keep everyone safe by doing all we can to prevent the spread of the coronavirus. Please register your name and phone number for contact tracing, and follow the guidance of our stewards. Please observe social distancing of 2 metres whenever possible. We are now required to wear face coverings when inside places of worship. We do need more volunteers as stewards for both the 6pm Saturday and 10am Sunday Masses.

AID TO THE CHURCH IN NEED - LEBANON APPEAL

An emergency help of £226,000 is to be rushed out to Beirut by ACN in the wake of the huge explosion (4th August). The Christian zone of Beirut was "completely devastated", with at least 10 churches destroyed, 300,000 people homeless and many others suffering, with livelihoods "totally destroyed" by the blast. *To find out more and for ways to help:* www.acnuk.org

This year marks the fifth anniversary of Pope Francis's important encyclical, *Laudato si'* and the Church is using the occasion to join the ecumenical ecological efforts to save the planet with great energy and commitment. In 2015, Pope Francis added the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation to the Catholic liturgical calendar to be celebrated on 1st September each year. In 2019, the Vatican asked Catholic communities and pastors everywhere to join ecumenical communities around the world in celebrating the Season of Creation from 1st September to 4th October. With encouragement from Bishop David, we will join in this season dedicated to prayer, reflection and celebration of God as Creator.
