Scripture Insights

Without denying the value of family, hard work, or financial stability, we consider today's readings carefully in our context of global capitalism, the prosperity gospel, and ongoing patriarchy. We must, as Paul suggests, stay awake and alert. Like Psalm 128 and Proverbs 32, Matthew's parable of the talents is challenging to interpret. New Testament parables often create "aha" moments of dramatic discovery or even existential crises that listeners did not expect. Nor do they necessarily align with the teller's view. Instead, they present scenarios that ask one to take a side and, in the process, often reveal the self-understandings of a listener or reader.

A "talent" in those days was a monetary sum equalling more than a worker could make in fifteen years; eight talents would be more than 120 years of wages. The slave master must be rich indeed to have that kind of wealth to give to his slaves. Although capitalism did not exist at the time, wealth was generally in the hands of a few who did not hesitate to exploit the poor majority, including through the practice of usury. More insidiously, if the slaves received the money and lost it for whatever reason

(including investment losses), they could become liable for losing their owner's money.

In other words, a "harsh" slave master who harvests where he "did not plant" and gathers "where he did not scatter" seed would be a familiar figure for Matthew's first readers. Many of them, like the last slave, would be "afraid" of such an unjust rich person; they knew the whole setup was a trap.

Connections to Church Teaching and Tradition

The parable in the Gospel of Matthew tells of servants who come to their day of reckoning with their master. Two servants have doubled the talents the master gave them while one servant returns with only what he was given. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* explains that each person is to care responsibly for what God has bestowed on them. The catechism states, "Everyone is responsible for his life before God who has given it to him. It is God who remains the sovereign Master of life. We are obliged to accept life gratefully and preserve it for his honour and the salvation of our souls. We are stewards, not owners, of the life God has entrusted to us. It is not ours to dispose of" (2280).

In the second reading, we hear St. Paul tell the Thessalonians to stay alert and awake. If we are alert to the stirrings of others, Pope Benedict XVI writes in *Caritas in veritate*: "Openness to God makes us open towards our brothers and sisters and towards an understanding of life as a joyful task to be accomplished in a spirit of solidarity (78).

REOPENING OF OUR LADY'S CHURCH FOR MASS

Our Lady's Church has had to close its doors only being permitted to open for Private Prayer and Funerals. You are reminded that the dispensation for not attending Sunday Mass, granted by the Bishops, is still in force, so there is no obligation to parishioners to attend a Sunday Mass. It could be some time before we return to normal. The safety of everyone is of

paramount importance to our Bishop, and he does not wish for anyone to be placed in vulnerable position of any kind. Outside of public liturgies advertised, you are invited to come and spend time in private prayer before the Blessed Sacrament:

Mondays: 2pm – 4pm and Thursdays: 10am to 12noon. I am grateful to those who have volunteered to act as stewards to ensure that we have a prayerful environment in the church and keep everyone safe by doing all we can to prevent the spread of the coronavirus. Please register your name and phone number for contact tracing or use the QR code with the NHS app, and follow the guidance of our stewards. **We are now required to wear face coverings when inside places of worship.** We do need more volunteers as stewards to cover the times the church is open for private prayer.

As the colder autumn weather has now arrived, the **Sacrament of Reconciliation or Penance or Confession** will be celebrated in the Sacristy once the Church can be reopened.

VIGIL OF PRAYER, SATURDAY 6pm 21 NOVEMBER 2020

The International Eucharistic Congress for 2020 has been postponed until next year. Cardinal Peter Erdö of Budapest-Estergom has asked that all parishes have a Holy Hour on Saturday 21 November – the Vigil of the Solemnity of Christ the King. He has asked that "in the current epidemiological situation...we can also join in from our homes with our personal prayers. Let us take part in this common adoration, join with your parish, your community and your family. Let this worldwide adoration be the next station of our preparation for the 52nd IEC in Budapest, and let us relive the regenerating love of God."
